Famous Foods

ASADO

Asado is world-class meat cuts salted and grilled to perfection. Once done, diners are presented with a choice of ribs, sirloin and tenderloin, among other cuts. Asado is a tradition shared by Argentine families and friends on Sundays.

EMPANADAS

Empanadas are disks of puff pastry folded and filled. The most popular types are meat, ham and cheese, and humita. Empanadas can be fried or baked, and they are the perfect finger food to grab and wander around Buenos Aires.

PASTELITOS

A pastry you can find in many bakeries, commonly eaten on national holidays, for dessert or as an afternoon snack. A pastelito is a square piece of quince jam covered in layers upon layers of puff pastry, then covered with sugar syrup. It's sweet!

Famous Drinks

COFFEE

Drinking coffee is a popular past time in Buenos Aires. It's offered 4 ways: **Café: Espresso.** **Cortado:** Espresso with a little milk. **Café con leche:** Half espresso, half warm milk. **Lágrima:** Warm milk with a little espresso.

MATE

Mate is an infusion of yerba mate dried leaves and hot water, sometimes orange peelings or peppermint are added for flavor. It's prepared and drunk in a cup through a metal straw called a bombilla. Argentines drink mate at any time. The mate is symbolic of friendship and companionship

WINE

Argentina is the 5th largest wine producer in the world. Argentina is most internationally known for its malbec, a wine variety that can vary in flavor, but is known for its dark purple red color, strong fruity flavors, and ample amount of tannins.

THE CITY

Buenos Aires is the capital of Argentina. It is one of the most populous cities in Latin America, as well as one of the most important ports. It has a compact tree-lined center, similar to Paris, with many charming corners where tidy high-rise apartments mingle with 19th-century buildings. This big city has managed to preserve many of its old traditions. The city has 47 "barrios", which are all unique. La Boca hosts the Caminito Street Museum, a colorful pedestrian-friendly zone that has an open-air museum and art market. It is painted in many bright colors, and has quality crafts, souvenirs and sculptures.

THE TOUR

Our one-hour walking tour will begin around the local market in Los Colegiales. The market was built in the 1920s and occupies an entire block. It was chosen by the "Meeting of Styles" Street Art Festival as one of its locations in 2011. Since then, international and Argentine artists have been sharing their art on the walls. During our tour, you will get to know the artists, their different styles and techniques, and discover the stories behind these murals. As we explore, we will discover how street art has an impact on day-to-day life and raises awareness about crucial topics.
